

Message from the Container Trucking Commissioner

The Office of the BC Container Trucking Commissioner (OBCCTC) was established in February of 2015 in order to build long term stability and sound economic conditions for the marine container trucking industry by, in part, ensuring fair remuneration for truckers. The BC *Container Trucking Act* (the *Act*) and Regulations are the foundation upon which stability in the industry rests. Through regulation and licencing under the *Act*, the OBCCTC continues to fulfill its mandate to grow stability by:

- Considering and applying all remedies available the *Act* and Regulations in order to identify and address non-compliance by licence holders;
- Ensuring transparency through regular reporting of OBCCTC activities outlined in the *Act* on the OBCCTC website; and
- Engaging all affected parties through a range of communication mechanisms including the Industry Advisory Committee.

In the first six months of the current Commissioner and Deputy Commissioner's term, the OBCCTC has pursued two key priorities - the completion of the 2016/17 licencing program and ongoing compliance activities as established by the previous Commissioners and Deputy Commissioner. In Fiscal 2016/17 the licence process will be complete and it is expected that Container Trucking Services licenses and Port of Vancouver Access Agreements will have been issued to 95 companies representing 1716 trucks. At March 31, 2016, the OBCCTC had undertaken 51 audits, published six decisions and issued one order.

The cost of OBCCTC operations are recovered from licence holders through a portion of the licence and Access Agreement fees paid to the OBCCTC and the Vancouver Fraser Port Authority under the TLS Program. The OBCCTC is responsible for balancing its budget and will continue to take a fiscally responsible approach to controlling OBCCTC expenditures in order to ensure balanced budgets.



During the last month of the 2015/16 fiscal year, Commissioner MacPhail and Deputy Commissioner Crawford focused on:

- Completion of the 2016/17 licencing program;
- Ensuring industry compliance with the rates and requirements under the *Container Trucking Act*, Regulation and Container Trucking Services Licence; and
- Engagement with licence holders and key stakeholders.


